




Now the Faughns could grow their own vegetables. They had dairy cows to milk, and they sold some of the milk. They also had a large herd of beef cattle to raise and sell.




Dale and his sons have chopped a lot of wood in their lives. The Faughns heat their home by burning logs from their farm. There are plenty of trees on the farm to provide for that.


Working hard on the farm was another way Dale showed his zest for living. He has cared for his farm. And the farm has given a lot back to him.




The farm has given the Faughns a wagonload of joy. It has given them pride. It has provided food, recreation, heat, and added income.
